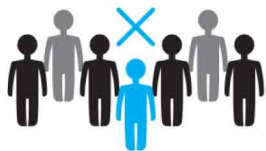


STAY HOME STAY HEALTHY

The Nisqually Indian Tribe has extended our Stay at Home Order indefinitely, with regular evaluation. Washington State has extended the Stay at Home Order through May 31st. The Country has begun a slow phased reopening. Washington has begun Phase 1 by reopening some outdoor recreational activities. The decision to enter a phase, remain in one phase, and enter the next, depends entirely on the data and our ability to test people, identify those who have potentially been exposed, and reduce the spread.

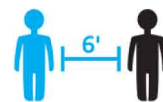
Until we have a vaccine available, we will need to continue many of the new behaviors we've learned.



Most large gatherings will remain prohibited.



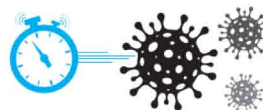
Teleworking and distance learning will continue.

WA HAS BEGUN TO ENTER PHASE 1. THE AMOUNT OF TIME IN ANY PHASE WILL DEPEND ON HOW WE RESPOND TO CORONAVIRUS AND PREVENT THE SPREAD OF COVID-19.

Summary of Phase	Phase 1 began on May 5 th with the reopening of some recreational activities, including day use at state parks, playing golf, fishing, and hunting.	Phase 2 will allow small gatherings of five or fewer people, new construction, and reopening of barber shops, salons, and pet care services.	Phase 3 will allow gatherings of up to 50 people, including sports activities, and non-essential travel can resume.	Phase 4 will involve resuming the majority of public interactions. Gatherings of more than 50 people will be allowed, but, until a vaccine is available, we must maintain social distancing
What this phase looks like for Nisqually	The Reservation area is still in our Stay at Home Order. Anyone entering the area will be screened. Limited programs are returning, including Building crews, Parks and Trails workers, Cemetery program, Garden crew, Hatcheries and river work, Shellfish farm and program.	Many programs will remain closed to prevent the spread of COVID-19. Programs with limited interactions may return, with Public Health Officer and Tribal Leadership evaluation. Strict guidelines remain, daily screening for all staff and visitors continues.	Programs will begin to return, following strict guidelines for social distancing and sanitation. Daily screening continues. Work from home for those who can telecommute is still encouraged.	We will slowly enter a “new normal” with programs that are able to return safely. Even with a vaccine, we will still have to continue some social distancing practices and be able to swiftly test and respond.
